Vidi Aquam During Pascha:

The Sacred Ministers process to the Altar. The priest receives the vessel of Holy Water from the minister; and after intoning the following Antiphon, which all continue. He sprinkles the altar, himself, the other ministers, the choir, and the people. The following is used during the Paschal season:

I saw wa - ter, com-ing forth from the right side of the tem - ple,
al - le - lu - ia.; and all who came to that wa - ter were saved,
and they shall say: al - le - lu - ia. al - le - lu -
- ia. O give thanks to the Lord for he is good:
for his mer-cy en-dures for - ev-er. Glo-ry to the Fa-ther and to the Son,
and to the Ho - ly Spir-it; as it was in the be-gin-ning,
is now and ev - er, for all a-ges of a - ges. A-men I saw wa - ter,
com-ing forth from the right side of the tem - ple, al - le - lu - ia.;
and all who came to that wa - ter were saved, and they shall say:
al - le - lu - ia. al - le - lu - ia.

Having returned to the altar, the priest stands before it, and sings the following:

V. Show us your mercy, O Lord. Alleluia!

R. And grant us your salvation. Alleluia!

V. Lord, hear our prayer.

R. And let our cry come to you.

V. The Lord be with you.

R. And with your spirit.

Priest: Let us pray. O Holy Lord, Father Almighty, Everlasting God, hear us we pray and send your Holy Angel from heaven to guard, cherish, ✠ protect, visit and evermore defend all who gather in this dwelling place;
Through Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

The Sarum Collect for Purity may be used in place of the above collect.

Priest: Almighty God, unto whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid, ✠ cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit that we may worthily serve you and magnify your holy name through Christ our Lord. *Amen*

The Introit Psalm may be sung straight through omitting the verses in brackets, or they may be added as needed to cover the action. If more time is needed the antiphon may be repeated after every two verses.

The priest arrives at the altar he uncovers his head and silently prays:

O Lord, take our sins from us that we may be made worthy to enter into the Holy of Holies with pure minds through Christ our Lord.

The clergy kiss the altar where the antimensium is, saying:


We beseech You, O Lord, by the prayers of Your Saints whose relics lie here, and of all the Saints, deign in your mercy to forgive all my sins. Amen

The Priest sets on incense and blesses the thurible saying: May this incense be blessed by him in whose honor it is burned. Amen.

The priest now censes the cross, bows, and censes around the altar counterclockwise returning to the middle. As he hands the thurible back to the minister he says quietly:



The Collect For The Day

Almighty God, who through your only-begotten Son Jesus Christ overcame death and opened to us the gate of everlasting life: Grant that we, who celebrate with joy the day of the Lord's resurrection, may be raised from the death of sin by your life-giving Spirit; through Jesus Christ your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, God, for all ages of ages. *Amen.*

The First Reading:

A Reading from the book of Acts (2:22-32)

Brethren: "You that are Israelites, listen to what I have to say: Jesus of Nazareth, a man attested to you by God with deeds of power, wonders, and signs that God did through him among you, as you yourselves know – this man, handed over to you according to the definite plan and foreknowledge of God, you crucified and killed by the hands of those outside the law. But God raised him up, having freed him from death, because it was impossible for him to be held in its power. For David says concerning him, 'I saw the Lord always before me, for he is at my right hand so that I will not be shaken; therefore my heart was glad, and my tongue rejoiced; moreover my flesh will live in hope. For you will not abandon my soul to Hades, or let your Holy One experience corruption. You have made known to me the ways of life; you will make me full of gladness with your presence.' "Fellow Israelites, I may say to you confidently of our ancestor David that he both died and was buried, and his tomb is with us to this day. Since he was a prophet, he knew that God had sworn with an oath to him that he would put one of his descendants on his throne. Foreseeing this, David spoke of the resurrection of the Messiah, saying, 'He was not abandoned to Hades, nor did his flesh experience corruption.' This Jesus God raised up, and of that all of us are witnesses.

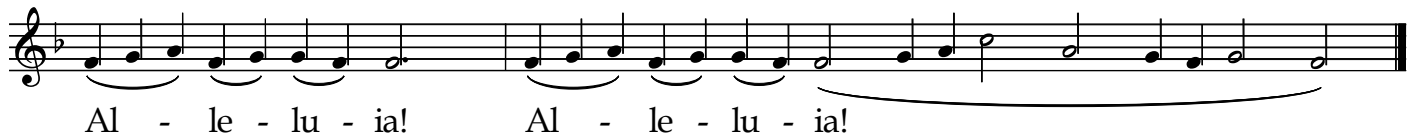



The Deacon takes the book from the altar, bows to the altar, inclines to the priest, and goes to the place appointed accompanied by a Subdeacon, Acolytes with lights, and a Thurifer with incense carried before. Standing, all turn toward him, as he announces the Gospel:

The Deacon traces a cross on the book then his forehead, lips and chest.

The Deacon censes the book three times.

He then sings the Gospel:

When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. They had been saying to one another, "Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?" When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man, dressed in a white robe, sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. But he said to them, "Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you." So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid.

The "Holy Kiss" is a triple embrace starting to your right. It begins with the celebrant and is passed to the Deacon and Subdeacon, and by them to the acolytes and congregation. It is done orderly as befits a holy act.

THE LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

In a Solemn Liturgy the Priest goes to the sedilia. The Deacon spreads a white linen cloth on the altar while the Offertory Chant is sung.










Having prepared the gifts, the Deacon bows to the Altar and the Priest.

The Priest comes to the center, bows to the Church; he turns, goes to the altar and standing before it says quietly:

Sanctify ✠ O Lord, these gifts offered by us,
and cleanse us from the stains of our sins;
through Jesus Christ our Lord.

The Incensation

On Sundays and Feasts, the Celebrant sets on incense, offered by the Subdeacon or Thurifer which he blesses saying:

Through the intercession of Blessed Michael the Archangel, standing at the right hand of the altar of incense, and of all His elect may the Lord bless ✠ this incense and receive it in the odor of sweetness. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

After incense is set, the Bishop censes the gifts and the altar: May this incense blessed by You, arise before You, O Lord, and may Your mercy come down upon us.

He walks around the altar with the Deacon before and Subdeacon behind him censing and saying:

Let my prayer, O Lord, arise like incense before You; the lifting up of my hands, like the evening sacrifice.

He returns to the center and gives the thurible to the Deacon saying:

May the Lord enkindle in us the fire of His love and the flame of everlasting charity. Amen

The Deacon then censes the Priest, the Subdeacon the Deacon, the Thurifer the Subdeacon and then he censes the acolytes and the people. During which the Acolytes present water and a towel and the Priest washes his hands saying quietly:

Lord wash away my iniquity,
cleanse me from my sin.

The Priest at the midst, inclines, hands joined, and prays this quietly:

Accept, most Holy Trinity, this offering which we are making to You in remembrance of the passion, death, resurrection, and ascension of Jesus Christ, Our Lord; and in honor of blessed Mary, ever Virgin, Blessed John the Baptist, the Holy Apostles Peter and Paul, and of all the Saints; that it may add to their honor and aid our salvation; and may they deign to intercede in heaven for us who honor their memory here on earth. Through the same Christ our Lord.

Acolyte. Amen.

The priest turns to the congregation, extends his hands and says:

Priest: Pray, Brothers and Sisters, that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the Father Almighty

He then crosses his hands over his chest and bows as they respond

All: The Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands
for the praise and glory of his Name,
for our benefit, and that of all his holy Church

Priest: Amen!

The Prayer over the Gifts: The Second Collect

He then begins the second collect which "secrets" or sets apart the gifts:

Priest: Accept, we ask you, O Lord, the prayers of your people with the offering of this sacrifice. May what we have begun in these Paschal Mysteries, by your grace, continue to illumine us to life everlasting; through Jesus Christ your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit,

The Church now stands attentively, reverently, as the Bishop or priest leads The People in the celebration of the most sacred part of the Liturgy.



The Anaphora of our Father among the Saints, Gregory

*Four acolytes with torches stand facing the altar inside the altar rail.
The priest extends his hands keeping his thumbs and forefingers joined.*

To you, therefore, most gracious Father,
we humbly pray through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord

He joins his hands, places his left hand on his breast, blessing the offering:

that you accept and bless ☩ these pure and holy gifts
which we offer to you in sacrifice.

He stretches out his hands:

We offer them on behalf of your holy catholic Church:
watch over her, gather her, guide her and grant her peace,
protection, and unity throughout the whole world
with your servants the Orthodox Patriarchs,
N. our Metropolitan Archbishop and
all Orthodox believers who hold the Catholic and Apostolic faith.

Remember, Lord, your faithful people,
and your servants standing here around your altar,
knowing how firmly we believe in you
and dedicate ourselves to you.

He joins his hands, prays briefly, then, with hands outstretched continues:

We offer to you this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving
for ourselves and for all those who are dear to us.
We pray to you our living and true God,
for our well being and redemption
and for those whose faith and devotion are known to you alone.

Communicantes

In communion with the whole Church, and celebrating the most sacred day of the Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ in the flesh, we venerate above all others the memory of the glorious ever-Virgin Mary, Mother of the same Jesus Christ our Lord God and our God; and also your blessed apostles and martyrs, Peter, Paul and Andrew...

He extends his hands over the offering before him saying:

Father, we humbly ask
that you accept this offering from your whole family.
Grant, that you may order our days in this life in your peace,

and number us among those you have chosen.



He joins his hands, places his left hand on his breast, blessing the offering:

Bless ✠ and approve our offering; make it acceptable to you,
that it may become for us
the ✠ body and ✠ blood of Jesus Christ,
your only Son, our Lord.

The Deacon removes the purificator and pall

He joins his hands and prays:



On the night he was handed over to suffering and death,

He lifts the paten with the Lamb slightly.

our Lord Jesus Christ took bread into his holy and venerable hands;
and when he had given thanks to you, *(pause)*
he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said:

He bows and sings the following words slowly:



"Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you.
Do this for the remembrance of me."

He pauses for a moment then replaces the paten.

After supper, he took the cup of wine;

He lifts the chalice slightly.

and when he had given thanks, *(pause)*
he gave it to them, and said,

He bows and sings the following words slowly:

"Take this all of you, and drink of it:
This is my Blood
which shall be shed for you and for many
for the forgiveness of sins.



He pauses for a moment then replaces the chalice.

As often as you do these things, you do them remembering me."

The Deacon steps forward and replaces the purificator and pall. The Priest stretches out his hands keeping his thumbs and forefingers joined.

Father, we celebrate the remembrance of Christ your Son:
We, your servants and your holy people,
call to mind his passion,
his resurrection from the dead,
and his ascension,
until he comes again in glory.
We offer to you, the God of glory and majesty,
from the many gifts you have given us,

Look with favor upon these offerings, and accept them

*He joins his hands, then places his left hand on his breast,
makes the sign of the cross*

Father, we pray that you send down your Holy Spirit upon us ✠



The Priest takes the chalice and paten, crosses his arms, lifts them to his eye level and sings:



The Priest replaces the Holy Mysteries, the Deacon replaces the pall, and the three Sacred Ministers bow deeply. The Deacon and Subdeacon return to their places at the altar step with the Deacon on the Epistle Side and the Subdeacon the Gospel Side. The Four acolytes with torches retire to the sacristy and return for communion.

The Breaking of The Bread

He stretches out his hands, keeping his thumbs and forefingers joined.

Priest: Let us pray:

Priest: Deliver us, ✠O God, from all evils: past, present, and to come, and by the prayers of Blessed Mary ever Virgin, Mother of God, of your blessed apostles Peter and Paul, of Andrew, and of all the saints, graciously give us peace in our days; that through your merciful help may we always be free from sin and safe from all disquietude: through Jesus Christ your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, God, for all ages of ages.

People: Amen.

The Priest may say the seasonal prayers over the people. If he does so, he turns around to his right with his back to the Gospel side so as not to turn his back to the Sacrament. The MC or the Subdeacon holds the book while he sings the prayers always ending with this blessing:

Priest: May Almighty God, by Whose providence you keep once more the Paschal Feast, grant you His blessing, and, in His mercy, be pleased to defend you from every evil thing.
Amen.

Priest: May He, Who restores you to eternal life, through the Resurrection of His only-begotten Son, invest you with the joys of immortality, when the same our Saviour Christ shall come again. *Amen.*

Priest: May you, who have kept the Lenten fast and the anamnesis of our Savior's Passion, and celebrate the joy of Holy Pascha, may be brought, through Divine assistance, to the joyful Feast that never ends. *Amen.*

Priest: May the Lord God Almighty, Whose glorious Kingdom endures for ever, be pleased to bestow these blessings upon you; and...

Priest: The ☩ Peace of The Lord be always with you.

People: And with your spirit.

The Deacon and Subdeacon approach the altar again. The Deacon removes the pall and the priest breaks the Bread. By ancient custom he places a small particle of the Sacrament into the chalice as a sign of unity with the Bishop saying:

May this mingling of the Body and Blood of Our Lord Jesus Christ bring eternal life to us who receive it.

Silence may be kept, or the Agnus Dei or another confractoria is sung.

The Deacon and Subdeacon turn toward the center of the altar.

The Priest turns to the faithful, holds the Paten and Chalice and says:

Priest: Behold the Lamb of God!
Behold Him who takes away the sin of the world!

People: Lord I am not worthy
that you should come under my roof.
Say but the word, and my soul shall be healed.

People: I believe, O Lord and I confess that you are truly the
Christ, The Son of the living God, who came into the
world to save sinners, of whom I am the greatest.

I believe also, that this which I am about to receive
is truly your most pure Body and life-giving Blood;
Wherefore, I pray, have mercy on me
and forgive my transgressions,
both voluntary and involuntary, in word and deed,
committed in knowledge or in ignorance;

And grant that I may partake of your Holy Mysteries without condemnation for the forgiveness of all my sins and for life everlasting.

O Son of God accept me this day
as a partaker of Your Mystical Supper;
for I will not reveal the Mystery to your enemies,
nor will I give you a kiss as did Judas,
but like the thief, will I say: ✕ Remember me, O Lord,
when you come into your kingdom.

O Lord, may the partaking of your Holy Mysteries
be not to my judgment or condemnation,
but for the healing of my soul and body.

The priest may pray the above with the people, or, inclining before the altar, and with hands joined or crossed upon his breast, may pray silently: Standing erect, he takes the Sacred Body saying:

*I will take the Bread of Heaven and call on the Name of the Lord:
May the Body of Our Lord Jesus Christ preserve my body and soul to everlasting life.*

Inclining, he receives, standing up again, he takes the chalice saying:

*What shall I render to the Lord for all his blessings to me?
I will take up the Cup of Salvation and call on the Name of the Lord.
I will pay my vows to the Lord in the presence of all his people;
in the courts of the house of our God; in your midst O Jerusalem.
May the Blood of Our Lord Jesus Christ preserve my body and soul to everlasting life.*

Inclining, he receives the Sacred Blood from the chalice. He then communicates the Sacred Ministers, the clergy, acolytes, and people. The Priest then communicates each person saying:

Priest: The Body and Blood of Our Lord Jesus Christ preserve your body and soul **N.** unto life everlasting.

People: Amen.

During the administration of the Sacrament the Communion Chant, the following psalm or a hymn may be sung.



PSALM 150 **Laudate Dominum**



- 1 Praise God in his holy temple; *
praise him in the firmament of his power.
- 2 Praise him for his mighty acts; *
praise him for his excellent greatness.
- 3 Praise him with the blast of the ram's-horn; *

Then the Deacon, removes the vessels to the credence table and, assisted by the Subdeacon or Minister, consumes the rest of the Sacrament, saying:

He then purifies his fingers, and cleanses the vessels. The acolyte places the missal on the Epistle Side.

All silently reflect on the reception of The Holy Mysteries.

He extends his hands singing:

People: And with your spirit.

Priest: Let us pray:

He sings the Prayer with hands extended.

Pour forth upon us O Lord, the Spirit of your love: that as you have fulfilled us with these Paschal Mysteries, so also of your goodness, make us to be of one heart and mind; through Jesus Christ your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, God, for all ages of ages.

People: Amen.

He inclines once more in the midst; turns, extends his hands, singing:

The Lord be with you.

People: And with your spirit.

Deacon: Bow down your heads before the Lord.

If a Bishop is present he takes his crosier faces the altar and, crossing his head and breast sings:

Bishop: Blessed be the Name of the Lord.

People: Now and forever.

Bishop: Our help is in the Name of the Lord.

People: The maker of heaven and earth.

He takes his crosier, turns to the people, and sings:

May Almighty God, who has redeemed us and made us his children through the resurrection of his Son our Lord, bestow upon you the riches of his blessing. *Amen.*

May God, who through the water of baptism has raised us from sin into newness of life, make you holy and worthy to be united with Christ for ever. *Amen.*

May God, who has brought us out of bondage to sin into true and lasting freedom in the Redeemer, bring you to your eternal inheritance. *Amen*

Priest: May the Blessing of God Almighty:
✠ The Father, ✠ the Son, and ✠ the Holy Spirit,
descend upon you and remain with you forever.

People: Amen.

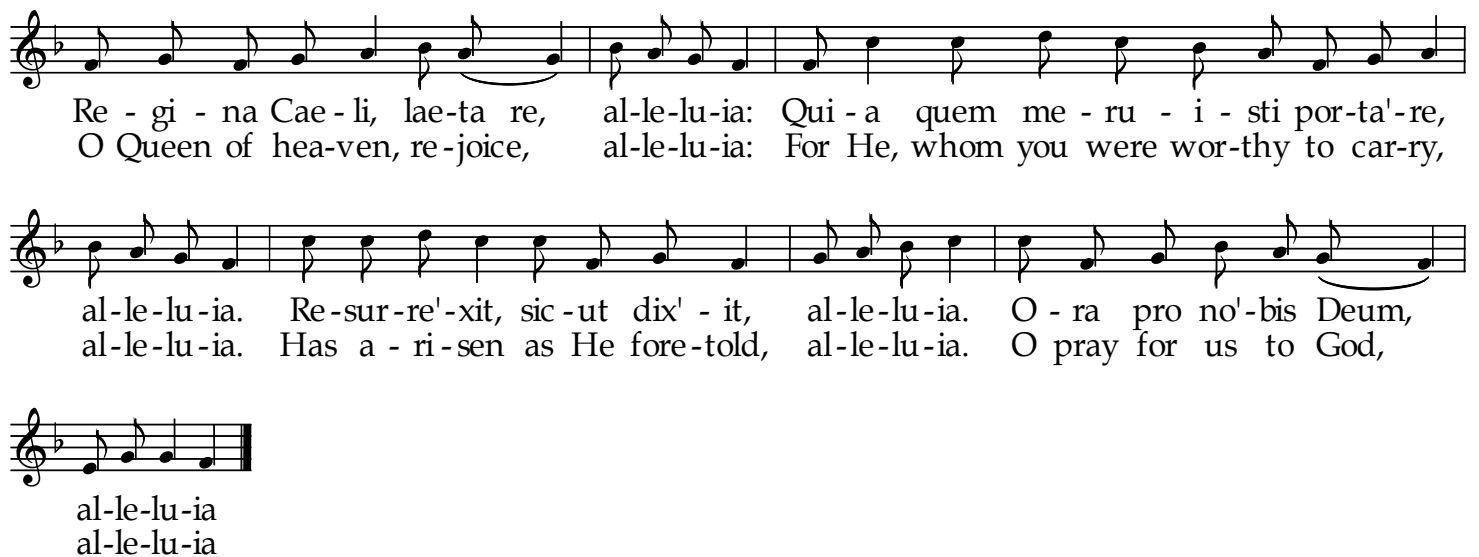

Bless, ✠ O Lord, this creature of bread, as You did bless the five loaves in the wilderness: that all who partake of it may receive health of both body and soul. In the name of the ✠ Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Deacon: Amen.

The Deacon holds the tray of bread in his hands. All approach, take a portion, kiss the (cross and) Priest's hand, and return to their places. The Sacred Ministers bow to the Altar, cover their heads, and depart.



In place of the usual prayers of thanksgiving the following are said:

Priest Glory to you O Lord our God and our hope! Glory to you!
